Windcall

Windcall is dedicated to nurturing and developing transformative learning and resilient leadership among community and labor organizers engaged in social justice for low-income communities and communities of color. Residencies are our flagship program. Since our founding 35 years ago, these residencies have offered life changing experiences to over 750 community and labor organizers from around the country and all sectors of the social justice movement. The Windcall Residency is a nine-month experience that provides a highly supportive environment in three phases:

- A robust onboard period to prepare individuals for the residency experience and introduce them to practices that lead to long-term sustainability and resilience
- 2. A one- to three-week residential retreat that removes many outside pressures and internal constraints that inhibit organizers' renewal.
- 3. An intentional offboarding period to support integration and continued learning through two reflection debriefs with staff, a virtual webinar with residents' peer group, and six sessions with a Windcall coach.
